



Tu B'Shevat Jeopardy for the Classroom

Purpose: Test knowledge of Tu B'shevat based on the TV show "Jeopardy". Answers are provided and the players provide the questions.

Materials needed: Jeopardy game board,
Tu B'Shevat answer/question cards

Playing directions:

1. Divide the cards into categories. Arrange cards in the pockets on the game board with the more difficult questions in the higher value pockets.
2. Choose a person to be the emcee. The emcee reads the answers and verifies the correct questions.
3. Divide players into two teams.
4. Two players from a team select a category and point value in that row. The emcee reads the answer and the two players try to give the correct question. If the question is correct, add the point value to the team total. If incorrect, subtract the point value from the team total.
5. Play continues with two players from the other team choosing a category and value.
6. The game continues until time is up (ex. 30 minutes), a designated total is reached (ex. 3000 pts.), or all answer/question cards are used.
7. The team with the most points wins.

NOTE: Many ways of phrasing an appropriate question may be correct. The decision is left to the teacher. Students may want to make their own game cards or add to the game cards.
